I Remember When !!!!!!

In 1990, I remember the first day I joined BODC. I had emigrated from Scotland where I had been involved in dog training with my two cocker spaniels.

There was the shed, with a table in front of it and a blonde girl called Amanda checking vaccination cards. The first problem was my re-vaccination dates which were schedule 2 years apart. It seemed that the long lasting vaccines had not been introduced in Oz!

(the UK was a bit further down the track with the issue of vaccinating dogs!)

That sorted out, I went to be assessed. The next problem was my lack of correction chain!!! Even though my dog walked at heel, I was told I must put one on her because everyone had to use one!! I sorted that by just placing the two rings together and attaching my lead so it worked as a normal collar.

Then the training began and, to my astonishment all treats were banned – (the UK had been very much further down the track with using methods of positive motivation!!!)

My overall impression was that the training methods were way behind the times but the people were friendly and it was the only club in Berwick so I stayed!! The facilities were non-existent. The shed was all they had except for a big tent that was put up for special occasions.

Going to the toilet involved getting a key from the people in the shed and walking over the embankment to the football club toilets!

After innocently turning up at an AGM one evening, I found myself on the committee, so I had the duty of going into the shed to take money and give out tokens (people paid each week and had to give a metal token to their instructor). Later down the track, as an instructor I would often forget to return the tokens before leaving. At home, when taking off my jeans there would be a shower of metal tokens all over the floor!

Eventually (after much fund raising) the club decided to build a clubroom. Luckily one of the committee was a builder! Jerry single handedly supervised a team of extremely unqualified people (myself included) to help with the construction. My best memory is of being on the roof and being taught how to use the nail gun (ooh good fun!) Jerry had marked where the nails were to go and I got to fire the gun in the right places.

Great celebrations when the clubroom opened - how luxurious after the shed!

Training methods at the club slowly started to change but not without much squabbling and huffing. I agreed to become an instructor once positive motivation and food rewards were introduced. In the 16 odd years I have instructed at the club there have been massive improvements and changes in training methods. The biggest change is that we no longer use the "one size fits all" approach. Each handler and dog are encouraged to use the equipment and methods that suit them!

During winter each year, there were some huge problems with the ground. When it rained, it became a complete quagmire. People and dogs came off the ground with mud up to their armpits! Hoses were needed and most dogs had to be washed before they could go home in the car. Many handlers gave up training in the winter as it was so unpleasant.

Asking the council to put drainage in got us nowhere, so the club paid for it to be done. I know some people may find it muddy at present but this is nothing compared to the old days!

Since then, the clubroom has had an extension put on for an office, the verandah has been widened (so we can all fit under when it's pouring!) and lots of trees have been planted. The whole set up is a far cry from the bare ground and shed I saw 20 years ago.

I remember when, back in 2002 if it rained during training we all ran back to the clubrooms, and about 70 people tried to squeeze onto the veranda which was then only 3 feet wide. YELLOW BANDANAS

The Berwick Obedience Dog Club has available **Yellow Bandanas** to identify dogs that may need a bit of space around them.

The reason for needing one could be:

- Nervousness
- Recovery from an operation (i.e.: convalescing)
- Unsociable to people or other dogs

When approaching a handler and dog with a yellow bandana, we should:

- Be respectful of their space
- Ask the handler if they are happy to socialize with your dog

When approaching a yellow bandana dog please make sure your dog doesn't go running up to it freely, just as the handler of the yellow bandana dog should be mindful of the space around their dog at all times.

Quite often handlers of yellow bandana dogs have put a lot of work into dealing with specific problems with them, so it would be disappointing if all their hard work was lost.

So if you feel your puppy needs to be given their own space, then go to the office and obtain a bandana for the day. Please return them when you have finished, so that other puppies can have their turn. This is not something the

BODC is forcing on handlers as it is your choice and for the wellbeing of your dog/puppy.



Are you interested in competing in trials with your dog?

If you would like to book in for a run through in one of our trial rings, here's how!

Come to club early and put your name and dogs name down on the sheet on the table outside the trial rings. Put down which trial class you are doing. The first trial class is called CCD. (The dog stays on lead except for the recall) You must have your name down before 2pm.

Advanced / Instructors 1pm to 2.30 pm Stays at 2.30 pm Beginners i.e. CCD / Novice 2.45pm to 3.45 pm

Be ready to go in when it's your turn. If you are not there, the next dog will be called. Everything stops at 2:30 for the ring stays.

Ring training will only be held if sufficient instructors are available

Do not enter when the flag is displayed - Obedience, Agility or Fly ball class is in progress.

Dog owners using this area are responsible for their dogs and injuries or damage caused by them.

Always consult those already using the area before entering.

Only stay 5 minutes if others are waiting.

Clean up after your dog.

Dogs showing signs of aggressive behavior towards people or other dogs must be removed from the area immediately.

Maximum of 8 dogs at a time.

All dogs must wear a collar and owners must carry a leash at all times while in the area.

Owners must not leave their dogs unattended while in the area.

LIFE WITH MJ (One Year On)

By the time you all read this article about MJ I will have had him for 1 year. I know that we always say that time goes by so fast, well in this case it has. It is hard to believe that on the 18th August 2009 that I went to pick him up from the breeder. I remember the day it was pouring rain and had been running for a number of days. It rained all the way home as my sister cuddled him as he was checking out all the cars and scenery. Even thou he struggled a few times he was unable to escape her cuddle.

Upon arriving home it was time to introduce him to Conor (my 13 year old golden and Wizard our 2 year old Shetland). Well Conor snubbed him as I put him down next to him on the mat. Wizard just keeping wanting to check out whether he had a brother or a sister to play with and want to smell his bum (typical dog welcome). As MJ lay on the mat checking out the new surroundings he was a little unsure and had that look is his eye 'where am I". Well that lasted about 1 minute as he hit floor up and running checking out all the things around the area.

He has always loved his food. The routine was that he was feed in the crate in the family room. He would not get his dinner until he sat in the crate. We trained him to sit or lay down with no noise while it was being prepared about 3 paces outside the kitchen area, which he did. But a soon as it was ready he would fly at full speed into the crate, do a big 180 turn in mid air and land sitting although impatiently waiting for his dinner. Gone in less than 60 seconds. We still have this routine today but he is fed outside, still does the 180 and sits.

I can remember the first night, not many of us got much sleep that night. As you would know from other stories I crate trained him. Well that night the crate lasted 5 minutes as he SCREAMED THE HOUSE DOWN and decided to destroy all the paper in the crate. So out of the crate and took up his place next to a very laid back golden retrieve in Conor who looked at him and then looked away thinking "what the". I spent the night on the couch with the lights on dim. He crashed until 6.00am the next morning. The next night was much better and over time he got use to it. A biscuit before bedtime really helped.

The first adventure outside was a highlight. He just charged out into the garden, getting into all the spots he shouldn't. The first wee was very exciting as he knew what the grass was for thus he was house trained in 2 weeks. Everyone was pleased with that. He loved pulling up the grass and running around with it in his mouth. It was a huge game to try and substitute a toy for the grass. I think even today I have had 70/30 win as the grass still gets the occasional removal.


Our first adventure to the vets was fun as he had to sit in the back of car by himself. After some crying I think he soon found out how much fun it was. Puppy class he just loved, to bad it was not very well run. Just as well I was an instructor and I knew the right and correct way to stop a puppy biting, to sit and stay, unlike the harsh measures they were showing the other participants to use on their puppies, very cruel.

I remember bring him to the 2009 AGM at the club. He had so much fun going around to every one and being given pats, cuddles and treats. Also he did make his mark by weeing on the floor, 'was this dog house trained??". But it was part of his meeting 50 people and 30 dogs before he was 6 months old. All this has helped make a very friendly boy.

There is heaps more that has happened in the last 12 since he moved in. He is now just under 40 kgs, solid not fat, fit, still does not have his full Golden Retriever coat, has a wonderful nature, is so loving, extremely play-ful, still a bit awkward and a is fantastic companion. What more could you ask for in a dog.

It has been a wonderful journey and so much fun and some sleepless nights, and I hope that it continues but that it what having a puppy is about. It is fun, exciting and full of fantastic memories. It is such a shame that they grow so fast, so if you currently have a puppy or are getting one enjoy every moment you can with them as puppies because they grow up to quick.
