


It's sound advice given frequently: supervise your dogs and kids warn parents, —Don't leave the dog alone with children, no matter

while they are together. Breeders how friendly the breed.

Veterinarians advise, —Never leave a dog and a child in the same room together. Dog trainers explain, —All dogs can bite so supervise your dog when you have children over. Everyone knows the drill. So why doesn't it work? Why are there an estimated 800,000 Americans seeking medical attention for dog bites each year, with over half of these injuries to children ages 5-9?

Note the good intentions of the kids. Note the closed mouth and half-moon eye of the dog. The bites are not a result of negligent parents leaving Fido to care for the baby while mom does household chores, oblivious to the needs of her children. In fact, I've consulted on hundreds of dog bite cases and 95% of the time the parent was standing within 3 feet of the child watching both child and dog when the child was bitten. Parents are supervising. The problem is not lack of supervision. The problem is no one has taught parents what they should be watching.

Parents generally have not received any education on what constitutes good dog body language and what constitutes an emergency between the dog and the child. Parents generally have no understanding of the predictable series of canine body cues that would indicate a dog might bite. And complicating matters further, most parents get confused by the good intentions of the child and fail to see when a dog is exhibiting signs of stress. The good news is all of this is easy to learn! We can all get better at this.

Here is a simple list to help you improve your supervision skills:

Watch for loose canine body language. Good dog body language is loose, relaxed, and wiggly. Look for curves in your dog's body when he is around a child. Stiffening and freezing in a dog are not good. If you see your dog tighten his body, or if he moves from panting to holding his breath (he stops panting), you should intervene. These are early signs that your dog is not comfortable.

Watch for inappropriate human behaviour. Intervene if your child climbs on or attempts to ride your dog. Intervene if your child pulls the ears, yanks the tail, lifts the jowls or otherwise pokes and prods the dog. Don't marvel that your dog has the patience of Job if he is willing to tolerate these antics. And please don't videotape it for YouTube! Be thankful your dog has good bite inhibition and intervene before it's too late.

Watch for these three really easy to see stress signals in your dog. All of them indicate you should intervene and separate the child and dog:

Yawning outside the context of waking up. Half-moon eye - this means you can see the whites of your outer edges of your dog's eyes.

Lip licking outside the context of eating food. Watch for avoidance behaviours. If your dog moves away from a child, intervene to prevent the child from following the dog. A dog that chooses to move away is making a great choice. He's saying, —I don't really want to be bothered, so I'll go away. However, when you fail to support his great choice and allow your child to continue to follow him, it's likely the dog's next choice will be, —Since I can't get away, I'll growl or snap at this kid to get the child to move away. Please don't cause your dog to make that choice. Listen for growling. I can't believe how many times I've heard parents say, —Oh, he growled all the time but we never thought he would bite. Dog behaviour, including aggression, is on a continuum. For dogs, growling is an early warning sign of aggression. Heed it. If growling doesn't work, the dog may escalate to snapping or biting. Growling is a clue that you should intervene between the dog and the child.

To pet owners, particularly those who also have children, thank you for supervising your dog! As a dog trainer and mother of two, I know that juggling kids and dogs is no easy feat. It takes patience, understanding, and a great deal of supervision. I hope these tips will help you get better at supervising.

If you want more information about this topic, a great resource is Colleen Pelar's book Living With Kids and Dogs Without Losing Your Mind.



5 FAST FACTS ABOUT

AUSTRALIAN SHEPERD

Personality - The Australian Sheperd is

quintessentially a working sheep dog but has been taken into thousands of homes around the world as a pet and companion. It is fun-loving and loyal but needs daily exercise and stimulation to keep it happy and healthy.



Favourite Activities - This

dog will excel at all dog sports, especially agility. It will lap up a game of soccer with the kids in the garden and will retire happily at night after a good daily outing with its guardian. Unless given enough exercise and mental stimulation, your Aussie Shepard may become problematic.

Backyard Requirements - Although this breed is highly active, it does not need an enormous backyard, as long as it receives sufficient exercise every day.



Watchdog Qualities — The Australian Sheperd is a guard dog by nature and will alert you to strangers with a typical Australian Sheperd – sounding bark or howl.

Hereditary Diseases - The most important things to look out for are Hip Dysplasia and eye problems, although the breed can also suffer from Von Willebrand's disease. Good breeders will test for many of these problems. It is also a good idea to see the pup's parents if possible when buying

5 FAST FACTS ABOUT

BORDER COLLIE

Personality - An intelligent and energetic breed, the Border collie is a loving and friendly dog that must be included as part of the family. Its keen, alert and eager nature is coupled with a kind temperament. This highly loyal dog is extremely mentally active and needs lots of attention and enjoys socialisation.



Favourite Activities - These working dogs are easily trained and thrive on activities that involve mental stimulation. They love daily walks or a fast game of catch. If they are allowed to do what they please or are deprived of exercise and mental stimulation, they will become bored and get up to mischief.

Backyard Requirements - They need a clean environment, fresh water and shade. They also need a reasonably sized backyard with plenty of things to keep them occupied. Regular long walks are essential.

Watchdog Qualities — Border Collie's can be good guard dogs, because they are so alert and agile. They will generally bark at anyone lurking around the house and will probably round up any burglars!



Hereditary Diseases - Ceriod

Lipofuscinosis and Collie Eye Anomaly can now be checked for through DNA testing of the parents. They can also suffer from Hip Dysplasia. For further information on any problems can be found at www.bccnsw.com.

Yellow Bamilanas

The Berwick Obedience Dog Club has available **Yellow Bandanas** to identify dogs that may need a bit of space around them.

The reason for needing one could be:

- Nervousness
- Recovery from an operation (i.e.: convalescing)
- Unsociable to people or other dogs

When approaching a handler and dog with a yellow bandana, we should:

- Be respectful of their space
- Ask the handler if they are happy to socialize with your dog

When approaching a yellow bandana dog please make sure your dog doesn't go running up to it freely, just as the handler of the yellow bandana dog should be mindful of the space around their dog at all times.

Quite often handlers of yellow bandana dogs have put a lot of work into dealing with specific problems with them, so it would be disappointing if all their hard work was lost.

So if you feel your puppy needs to be given their own space, then go to the office and obtain a bandana for the day. Please return them when you have finished, so that other puppies can have their turn. This is not something the BODC is forcing on handlers as it is your choice and for the wellbeing of your dog/puppy.



Club - Hydro-Bath

The club has purchased (using funds from the chocolate drive) a hydro-bath to give your dogs a quick rinse of the little bit of mud that they might collect while training. Come the warmer months we will be able offer its use to you to use for a full wash.

Some dogs are not used to being in a hydro-bath and need to be 'trained' before they feel happy about

staying in it. If you have one of these dogs please try to come outside of the rush at the end of each session, so we can spend more time with you and your dog

Off - Leash Area Rules

- * Do not enter when the flag is displayed Obedience, Agility or Fly ball class is in progress.
- * Dog owners using this area are responsible for their dogs and injuries or damage caused by them.
- Always consult those already using the area before entering.
- Only stay 5 minutes if others are waiting.
- Clean up after your dog.
- * Dogs showing signs of aggressive behavior towards people or other dogs must be removed from the area immediately.
- * Maximum of 8 dogs at a time.
- * All dogs must wear a collar and owners must carry a leash at all times while in the area.
- * Owners must not leave their dogs unattended while in the area.
- No toys are to be used in the off leash area on club days
 Beginners are not to use the off leash area. (unless during training with a BODC instructor)
- No young children permitted in the area.
- * Some of these rules are not on the fence, as they are only during club hours.
